Frequently asked questions

What is a hospice house?

A hospice house is a peaceful, homelike facility specifically designed and staffed to provide hospice care to patients in the last weeks of life. The focus of a hospice house is keeping the family around the patient; spiritual and psychosocial support are available to help families through the bereavement process.



Why do we need a hospice house?

Tailored for end-of-life care, our hospice house allows us to provide excellent care (at a lower cost) for patients at the end of life who would otherwise require hospitalization.

Although hospice houses are common in other parts of the country, California has only about ten. Ours is the only hospice house in San Mateo County.

Who stays in the hospice house?

The hospice house enables us to serve patients who need intensive, round-the-clock hospice care that cannot be provided at home. The house also offers short stays for terminally ill patients whose caregivers need a few days of respite.





Where is the hospice house?

The hospice house is centrally located, in the Hayward Park neighborhood, the heart of San Mateo.

The facility has 10 rooms, spread across two intimate five-room buildings surrounded by gardens.

What kind of care do patients receive in the hospice house?

Our professional staff provides intensive pain management and skilled round-the-clock hospice care in a serene, homelike setting. Full-time palliative care allows loved ones to spend quality time with the patient while professional hospice staff attend to the patients' physical needs.

Our hospice house is managed by a full-time nursing program director. Patients are cared for by experienced hospice nurses, home health aides, hospice physicians, social workers, spiritual counselors, and volunteers.



How does the hospice house serve families?

As with all of our hospice care, the focus at the hospice house is on family support and patient comfort. The hospice house is designed not only for patients but also for their family and friends. It includes places for families to gather, as well as room for overnight guests.

The common areas and lovely gardens at the hospice house offer a beautiful, welcoming environment. Our social workers, bereavement counselors, spiritual counselors, and volunteers support families throughout the end-of-life process.



How are patients admitted?

As space is available, individuals are admitted when the family and physician decide that hospice care would best be provided in the hospice house.

Mission Hospice works with each patient, family, and physician to find the best place for each person to receive our hospice care.

How long do patients stay in the hospice house?

While each patient's experience and needs are unique, patients typically stay in the hospice house a few days to a few weeks.

What does this care cost? Who pays for it?

Medicare and private insurance pays much of the expense of patient care. Donations support patients not covered by insurance or Medicare, and when insurance doesn't cover the actual costs of delivering quality care and service. The costs associated with room and board in the hospice house are privately paid, based on a sliding scale.





How can I support the Hospice House Campaign?
